
McDonald's Corp announced its second-ever loss — its first in nearly five years — losing \$711.7 million in the second quarter.

Meanwhile, **Home Depot Inc** the world's largest home improvement store chain, reported a

14.8 percent drop in second-quarter profit as sales slid, particularly at stores open at least a year.

Starbucks Corp will raise U.S. prices on coffee, lattes and other drinks by an average of 9 cents a cup to help offset soaring costs for milk

and other commodities. This marks the second price increase in less than a year. U.S. milk prices have soared recently amid strong global demand for dairy products and higher production costs.

RPD monthly report

Special points of interest:

On July 29, 2007 at about 2200 hours, Ridgecrest Police Officers responded to the car wash at 433 N China Lake Blvd. on the report of an armed robbery which had just occurred. The suspects were described and were last seen leaving the area into the dark alley at the rear of the business. Officers responded quickly and searched the area but did not locate the suspects.

The victims advised that they were at the business cleaning their cars, when they were approached by

the suspects who asked for directions. One of the suspects grabbed a purse from the car and the other produced a full size handgun when the victims started to object.

There are no cameras or other recording devices available at the business, though some evidence of the crime and the suspects were recovered at the scene by Officer Taylor and Detective Lawson.

On July 30, 2007 three suspects were detained in Kingman Arizona attempting to use the vic-

tims credit cards and they are all in custody at this time, and await extradition. A fourth suspect associated to the group is in custody in Ridgecrest on unrelated charges. Additionally other property belonging to the victim has been recovered locally.

The Ridgecrest Police Department reminds all its citizens to "use caution" anytime you are out and especially after dark and in low light areas.

Suspects arrested with Possession of Stolen Property

On July 19, 2007 at about 0255 hours, Ridgecrest Police Officers responded to the area of N La Paloma St and W Conejo Ave on the report of suspicious persons looking in cars and one carrying something heavy. Prior to Officers arriving, witnesses advised the vehicle and suspects had fled.

Officers of the Ridgecrest Police Department and Deputies of the Kern County Sheriffs Dept quickly arrived in the area. The suspects were located and they briefly attempted to evade the patrol units, driving quickly back and forth through the tight residential area, but were stopped in the 600

block of N Peg St.

Inside the open trunk of the car was commercial tile saw, still wet from use. The male suspect initially claimed it was his. In the backseat were also two lawn statues.

Officers returned to the original scene and contacted victims there who

Assault With a Deadly Weapon

On July 1, 2007 at about 1920 hours, Ridgecrest Police Officers responded to Mervyn's on the report of an assault with a knife. Prior to arrival of officers, the victim's advised Dispatchers they had followed the suspect as he attempted to escape to the 700 block of N Balsam St.

Sgt. Obergfell arrived on scene and found the suspect standing in the middle of the

street with the knife partially concealed behind a ball cap. The suspect was taken into custody at gunpoint without injury, though he remained resistant and uncooperative.

The victims advised the suspect, JENNINGS, had confronted them in the parking area of Mervyn's, and threatened to kill Mr. READ. JENNINGS grabbed READ's arm, then produced a locking blade knife, which had

been concealed. READ backed away in his vehicle and the suspect attempted to flee. READ fearing for others followed the suspect, who again attempted to confront the victims in the street, but they remained in their vehicle at a distance.

JENNINGS was transported to KCJ-Ridgecrest where he was booked. He remains in custody at the time of this press release.

Arrest Made in Stolen Property

On July 23, 2007 at about 2050 hours, Ridgecrest Police Officers spotted ANDEKIN riding a bicycle at the listed location. The bike matched the BOL (be on lookout) for a bicycle which had been stolen the night before.

ANDEKIN was stopped and told Officers that he had "just found" the bicycle nearby, however this story did not compare to others in his party. He was also found to be in possession of a narcotics smoking pipe and a concealed knife. The bicycle was positively



identified as stolen by its serial number, and the suspect was arrested at the scene. The property was returned to its owner, and the suspect, ANDEKIN was booked at KCJ Ridgecrest on the felony charge where he later bailed and awaits trial.

Suspect Arrested in giving false information

On July 9, 2007 at about 1855 hours, Ridgecrest Police Officers arrived at Mickey's Pub, 1661 N Triangle Dr.. There they located the vehicle of the above suspect, wanted on several outstanding warrants of arrests. Inside they found a subject who met the description of the suspect, but provided a different name.

As the Officers escorted this subject outside, he ran. Several Officers gave chase and the suspect fled into the nearby neighborhoods. A perimeter was set and a yard to yard search ensued. During the search

the suspect was spotted hiding in the easement between the residences in the 200 block of W Perdew and W. Alene Ave. Officer contacted the suspect and he was taken into custody.

A search of the suspect's other names and alias' revealed he was also wanted out of the State of Colorado on additional Felony warrants. He was transported to Ridgecrest Regional Hospital where he was treated for injuries. He was then transported to CRF-Bakersfield where he remains in custody without bail.

The Democrats of the High Desert (formerly the Walter Stern Democratic Club) dedicated their newly adopted roadway with a vigorous clean up early Friday (27th of July). "This is one way to give back to our community", says Joy Parker, their president.

Their thoroughfare consists of Bowman Rd. from Norma to Downs. As many area residents know the section of Bowman from China Lake Blvd. to Downs can be particularly problematic due to the chain link fence that surrounds the adjacent drainage corridor. New State Traffic Control Manual

As provided by State Law, local agencies must comply with the uniform traffic control standards and specifications adopted by the State Department of Transportation. Late last year, Caltrans adopted the California MUTCD. This document replaces all previous traffic control publications. The City of Ridgecrest is required to follow this manual in planning and installing all traffic control devices and delineation. An overview of the development of the manual is shown below.

California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices



As of September 26, 2006, the California Department of Transportation has adopted the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (FHWA’s MUTCD 2003 Revision 1, as amended for use in California), also called the California MUTCD, to prescribe uniform standards and specifications for all official traffic control devices in California. This action was taken pursuant to the provisions of the California Vehicle Code Section 21400 and the recommendation of the California Traffic Control Devices Committee (CTCDC).

This combined document, the California MUTCD incorporates FHWA’s MUTCD 2003 Revision 1 dated November 20, 2004 and the MUTCD 2003 California Supplement dated May 20, 2004. It also incorporates all policies on traffic control devices issued by the California Department of Transportation that have been issued since May 20, 2004 and other editorial, errata and format changes that were necessary to update the previous documents.

The California MUTCD supersedes and replaces the previously adopted (on May 20, 2004) MUTCD 2003 Edition and the MUTCD 2003 California Supplement as well as Chapters 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, 11, 12 and the traffic signals portion of chapter 9 of the 1996 Caltrans Traffic Manual, as amended, and all previous editions thereof. It does not supersede the Department’s Standard Plans, Standard Specifications or the Special Provisions publications.

The non-traffic control device topics of the 1996 Caltrans Traffic Manual (Chapters 1, 2, 3, 7 and the lighting portion of chapter 9) are being retained in their current form until they are assimilated into other manuals or guidelines not yet determined.

In order to provide training on the content, changes, compliance, and applications in the new manual, Caltrans conducted a workshop in D9. The purpose of the training was to provide necessary information to traffic engineering and operations practitioners. This workshop was open to all local agencies. The City of Ridgecrest was represented at the workshop. A brief description of the workshop follows.

Description:

This class will familiarize participants with the new format, applicability and compliance aspects of the California MUTCD. The class will also expose attendees to new policies and changes that became official on September 26, 2006. It will emphasize application areas of the California MUTCD that often pose difficulties or have significant professional differences and also where California practice differs substantially from Federal practices.

Some recently adopted policies per CHP's Older Californian Traffic Safety Task Force related to older drivers and pedestrians will be highlighted. The class will cover some fundamental and key concepts of each individual part of the California MUTCD to encourage their use generally as a good practice.

Wastewater Report

The City of Ridgecrest Consolidated treatment Facility operated for the month of July with no operational or unusual maintenance problems.

The department as routine maintenance hydro flushed 2,000 ft. of main line collection system.

The reclamation department reclaimed 8.5 million gallons of secondary effluent for use as fodder crop irrigation.

Engineering

Private Sector Projects

The demand for inspection and plan checking is still increasing primarily in the commercial and residential sectors. There are currently about 38 new residential subdivisions being processed with a total of more than 3200 new lots. In addition to these there are about 1500 lots in the Ridgecrest Heights area that are vacant and build able. Actual development has however slowed in anticipation of the outcome of the BRAC process and the air corridor issue. D.R. Horton Company has commenced grading for a subdivision of about 200 lots on College Heights between Springer and Kendall. Recent national financial events and the level of foreclosures has cast a cloud over single family residential development. There however seems to be a trend towards multiple family and apartment developments.

Street Projects

Aside from normal street maintenance we have no active street projects under construction.

Traffic Signals

The video cameras have been installed at all seven traffic signals operated by the City and are now operational.


R-2508 – JOINT LAND USE STUDY (JLUS)

The R-2508 JLUS is a multi-jurisdictional review of the land use policies and other compatibility issues for the restricted air space area of the R-2508 Special Use Airspace Complex. The study is being developed by the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR), State of California and partially funded by a Kern County contribution. The local communities, counties, state agencies, federal agencies and the following military facilities; Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake, Edwards Air Force Base, Fort Irwin, and the R-2508 Special Use Airspace Complex have designated representatives on the joint committee. Ned McKinley, is the Senior Project Manger for OPR. There is an Advisory Committee, a Technical Committee and a Consultant, working together with OPR staff. The goal for the JLUS is to reduce potential conflict amongst the military and surrounding communities while accommodating growth, sustaining the economic health of the region and protecting the public health and safety. The JLUS participants are identifying a set of tools and strategies that support land use compatible planning, mission compatible land use, mission sustainability and reduce the potential for conflicts and encroachment.

A copy of the JLUS Matrix and the R-2508 Complex is available at City Hall. Each tool/strategy has a reference number within the study. An initial listing of 96 tools has been reviewed and recommended to be reduced and/or combined into 61 items, 35 relating to the City of Ridgecrest, of which 27 are primary responsibilities. A draft JLUS study report is anticipated to be completed in October of 2007.

Wal-Mart Supercenter and Retail Center

The notice of Completion and Availability for the Draft Environmental Impact Report for the proposed Wal-Mart Supercenter and Retail Center was filed on July 18, 2007. Copies of the draft E.I.R. are available at City Hall in both hard copy and a disc format. The draft document will be circulated for a 45 day period for public comment.



GENERAL PLAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

On July 24, 2007 the General Plan Advisory Committee held its fifth meeting which included the following topic areas:

MAP ATLAS – PART TWO OF TWO

The Committee was briefed on the second part of the Map Atlas from the Consultants – Matrix Design. It was noted that the purpose of the maps was to provide a good foundation representing Ridgecrest as it is today. The consultants had received the GPAC comments regarding Map Atlas Part One and would review those comments and any other comments received for Map Atlas Part Two before undertaking a revision of the entire Map Atlas.

There was discussion back and forth as to the merits or otherwise of including vacant land on Base in the City's Existing Land Use table. GPAC approved a motion to "take out any Navy land and leave in any BLM land".


Additional handouts were provided to members, including:

Existing Land Use Map. Planner Alexander noted this map would be particularly useful given that there had been considerable discussion regarding infill.

Chairman Taylor summarized suggesting that the land be presented in multiple column formats – anything that would effectively extract the detailed information required by members. He then asked if the Land Use Map showed undeveloped land. Planner Alexander explained it was shown in light beige however after discussion there was general agreement that vacant land should be shown in a contrasting color so that upon initial review it was evident where vacant land sat. Chair Taylor then provided a copy of a Land Use Map provided by the County Assessor showing vacant land as white.

Existing Land Use Data. Planner Alexander noted that at present there wasn't incentive for the City to annex land for redevelopment due to the current tax agreement with the County. He referred to recent coverage of the topic in the media.

The Existing Land Use Map illustrated below is a critical tool necessary for good land use planning



BOWMAN CREEK ALTERNATIVES

This item was introduced by the staff describing the Bowman Corridor as being 6 miles long and varying from 140 to 240 feet in width, being a multipurpose piece of land and indicating the City now had a draft E.I.R. for the New Wal-Mart project which was planned for location at the intersection of China Lake Boulevard and Bowman Road. The one mile portion of the Bowman Corridor between Norma Street and Sunland Street is considered the "Pilot Project" indicating the area of focus would be China Lake Boulevard, Bowman Road and the Drainage Channel as it was that portion of the Bowman Creek which would be influenced by the Wal-Mart development.

Dan Lare of Dan Lare Planners was introduced as the consultant of choice to assist with development of a plan for the Bowman Corridor.

Mr. Lare introduced himself to the Committee and stated that he intended to show members two different approaches as to how they might use a drainage channel. He indicated he was looking for consensus from members as to which option they preferred. Mr. Lare then went on to say that upon his review of the project area he believed it to be a "gateway" to Ridgecrest.

The Indian Bend Wash in Scottsdale illustrated below offers a good example of a multi-purpose drainage area and recreational resource.



Mr. Lare made a slide presentation to the Committee and asked them to consider among other things; how they wanted to use the land – for e.g. reducing the land set aside for roadway, installing a "roundabout" versus traffic signals and how they wanted the Wal-Mart building to look showing examples of buildings erected by Wal-Mart which he believed to be attractive and fitting of the landscape in Ridgecrest. Mr. Lare noted that these considerations were peripheral to his contribution but that he felt that thinking outside the box is important to considerations for the overall vision of the project.

Mr. Lare summarized the existing conditions noting there were pools of water gathering between Norma Street and China Lake Boulevard and the fence line was collecting plastic bags. Mr. Lare then presented further slides showing what can be done with trails and

Vice-Chair Smith asked members of the Committee if anyone was opposed to either of the options presented by Mr. Lare. Member Roulund stated that he was opposed to the green belt option. Vice-Chair Smith then asked the Committee if there was general consensus on asking Mr. Lare to move forward with Option B and all responded affirmatively. Vice-Chair Smith then asked if any member of the Committee was opposed to the idea of a roundabout and no oppositions were voiced. Vice-Chair Smith then told Mr. Lare that he had the direction he had requested from the Committee. A conceptual plan for Bowman Creek between Norma Street and Sunland Street will be prepared by Mr. Lare on behalf of the City.

NEXT GPAC

The next GPAC meetings are scheduled for 5:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers on August 28 and August 29, 2007.

PLANNING COMMISSION:

On July 24, 2007, the Planning Commission considered the following discussion items:

BOWMAN CREEK AND GATEWAY ALTERNATIVES

Jim Fallgatter made a presentation to the Planning Commission. But first he stated his support for the idea of trash mitigation as a condition of the proposed Super Wal-Mart just spoken of by Mr. Gorman under "comments from the public" section of the Planning Commission meeting. Mr. Fallgatter noted that as a member of the Exchange Club he had the past weekend collected a great deal of trash from the area next to the existing Wal-Mart.

Jim Fallgatter stated to the Commissioners that the Wal-Mart project may be the largest commercial development in the history of Ridgecrest and asked Commissioners to look at maximizing the opportunity even if it means taking some "heat from Wal-Mart". Mr. Fallgatter said that Wal-Mart is the anchor of the commercial center envisioned by the General Plan over 15 years ago.

Specifically Mr. Fallgatter asked the Commission to consider the concept of a bridge, and bike and pedestrian underpass to allow access across China Lake Boulevard between the proposed Wal-Mart development and the entities across the road. Mr. Fallgatter stated that he believed the bridge could tie in with the concept introduced by Mr. Lare at the GPAC meeting of a landmark welcoming visitors to Ridgecrest.

Andy Kilikauskas then addressed the Planning Commission. He seconded Mr. Fallgatter's comments stating "this is a once in a lifetime opportunity, we have to look at a lot of options because this one mile project will set the standard for the rest of the six miles". Mr. Kilikauskas stated that he felt there were opportunities to make the area more pleasant including that of making a smaller road and creating more space for recreation. Mr. Kilikauskas stated he thought the City should keep an open mind when negotiating with Wal-Mart.

Mr. Fallgatter further commented that when negotiating there could be an opportunity to move money from one area to another – for example if a roundabout was more cost efficient than stop lights that might allow for further funding of recreation use of the corridor.

DEVELOPMENT REVIEW GUIDELINES

The staff made a presentation to the Planning Commission regarding development standards for the Zoning Ordinance. Sample development expectations for the City of Oakdale were presented primarily because the documents included user friendly graphics. The Commissioners then considered examples of residential developments where sidewalks were on one side of the road only, narrower streets and neighborhood parks. He suggested that the Commission consider including neighborhood parks as a requirement for residential developments by requiring that sumps be developed to park standards to provide joint park/sump use.

Commissioner Beres asked who maintained the parkway walks once installed and the staff responded that this was done by residents. Commissioner Beres then asked if the lighting landscaping district was ongoing to which Planner Matthew Alexander responded affirmatively.

Commissioner Jeglum commented that she liked the parks but would not want to live on the side of the street without a walkway. The staff responded that the ideas presented were not dissimilar to the layout of Heritage Village yet noted that plans for the village would not be accepted given the City's current public works street standards. The Commissioners were asked to consider why, if not for safety, more creative plans should be rejected.

Skip Gorman of 1140 Graaf Avenue urged that Xeriscaping be considered and stated his support for the ideas presented by Planner Alexander. Finally, Commissioner Beres said she would like the City to have a multi-use zoning in the future.
