

RESOLUTION NO. 117

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIDGECREST, CALIFORNIA, CALLING AND GIVING NOTICE OF THE HOLDING OF A GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN SAID CITY ON TUESDAY, THE 12TH DAY OF APRIL, 1966, FOR THE ELECTION OF CERTAIN OFFICERS OF SAID CITY AS REQUIRED BY THE PROVISIONS OF THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA RELATING TO GENERAL LAW CITIES AND FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY OF CERTAIN QUESTIONS RELATING TO RIDGECREST ANNEXATION NUMBER ONE AND SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the laws relating to general law cities in the State of California, a regular general municipal election shall be held on the 12th day of April, 1966 for the election of two members of the City Council of said City for the full term of four years, and three members of the City Council of said City for a term of two years; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Ridgecrest also desires to submit to the qualified electors of said City at said election the questions, propositions or measures relating to the matters hereinafter set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIDGECREST, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That pursuant to the requirements of the laws of the State of California relating to General Law Cities within said State, there shall be, and there is hereby called and ordered, held in the City of Ridgecrest, County of Kern, State of California, on Tuesday, the 12th day of April, 1966, a regular general municipal election of the qualified electors of said City for the purpose of electing two members of the City Council of said City for the full term of four years, and three members of the City Council of said City for a term of two years.

SECTION 2. That said City Council, pursuant to its right and authority so to do, does hereby determine that there shall be and there is hereby ordered submitted to the qualified electors

A REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON THE ORGANIZATION OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT
SUBMITTED TO THE PRESIDENT AND THE SENATE
BY THE COMMISSIONERS

The Commission on the Organization of the Federal Government was organized on July 1, 1947, by Executive Order of President Truman. Its purpose was to study the organization of the Federal Government and to recommend such changes as would improve its efficiency and economy. The Commission has held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions from interested citizens. It has also conducted extensive research into the various agencies and departments of the Federal Government. The following report is the result of its work.

The Commission believes that the Federal Government is a complex organization, and that its efficiency and economy can be improved by a number of changes. These changes should be made in a systematic and orderly manner, and should be based on a sound understanding of the needs of the Nation. The Commission believes that the following changes are essential for the improvement of the Federal Government:

1. The Commission believes that the Federal Government should be organized on a basis of functional responsibility. This means that the various agencies and departments should be organized so that they are able to perform their functions in a coordinated and efficient manner. This requires a reorganization of the Federal Government so that the various agencies and departments are placed under the authority of the President, and so that they are able to coordinate their activities with one another.

2. The Commission believes that the Federal Government should be organized on a basis of economy. This means that the Federal Government should be able to perform its functions in a cost-effective manner. This requires a reorganization of the Federal Government so that the various agencies and departments are able to share their resources and so that they are able to eliminate unnecessary duplication of effort.

3. The Commission believes that the Federal Government should be organized on a basis of accountability. This means that the various agencies and departments should be held accountable for their actions and for the results of their activities. This requires a reorganization of the Federal Government so that the various agencies and departments are held accountable to the President and to the Congress.

The Commission believes that these changes are essential for the improvement of the Federal Government. It believes that these changes will result in a more efficient and economical Federal Government, and that they will result in a more accountable Federal Government.

A cross (+) placed in the voting square after the word "YES" in the manner hereinbefore provided shall be counted in favor of the adoption of these questions or propositions. A cross (+) placed in the voting square after the word "NO" in the manner hereinbefore provided shall be counted against the adoption of these questions or propositions.

SECTION 3. That the ballots to be used at said election shall be, both as to form and matter contained therein, such as may be required by law to be used thereat.

SECTION 4. That the City Clerk of said City is hereby authorized, instructed and directed to procure and furnish any and all official ballots, notices, printed matter and all supplies, equipment and paraphernalia that may be necessary in order to properly and lawfully conduct such election.

SECTION 5. That the compensation of the persons hereinabove named as election officers is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty-one (21) Dollars for each Inspector and Eighteen (18) Dollars for each Judge and Clerk, for said election. The rental for each of such polling places where a charge is made shall be

the sum of twenty-five (25) Dollars for said election.

SECTION 6. That the polls for said election shall be open at seven o'clock A.M. of the day of said election and shall remain open continuously from said time until seven o'clock P.M. of the same day, when said polls shall be closed, except as provided in Section 14436 of the Elections Code of the State of California.

SECTION 7. That in all particulars not recited in this resolution, said election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding municipal elections in said City.

SECTION 8. That notice of the time and place of holding said election is hereby given and the City Clerk is hereby authorized, instructed and directed to give such further or additional notice of said election in time, form and manner as required by law.

SECTION 9. That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution; shall enter the same in the book of original Resolutions of said City, and shall make a minute of the passage and adoption thereof in the records of the proceedings of the City Council of said City in the minutes of the meeting at which the same is passed and adopted.

SECTION 10. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.


