

RESOLUTION NO. 99-20

A RESOLUTION OF THE RIDGECREST CITY COUNCIL DECLARING ITS INTENT TO CONSTRUCT IMPROVEMENTS; SETTING A PUBLIC HEARING THEREON AND PROVIDING NOTICES FOR CURB & GUTTER AND/OR SIDEWALK COMPLETION PROJECT NO. SW99-12 and SW99-13.

The Ridgecrest City Council resolves as follows:

1. Purpose and Scope

The Superintendent of Streets of the City of Ridgecrest has recommended certain public improvements to be installed pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Sections 5870 et seq and/or City Council Policy No. 86-1. This resolution implements the Superintendent's recommendation.

2. Subject Properties

The Superintendent of Streets shall initiate proceedings under the Streets and Highways Code Sections 5870 et seq. and/or City Council Policy No. 86-1 for the purpose of constructing certain public improvements in front of the properties (hereinafter "subject properties") described on Exhibit A attached hereto.

3. Subject Improvements

The improvements (hereinafter "subject improvements") are described on Exhibit A attached, and they are hereby ordered in front of the subject properties.

4. Public Hearing

On Wednesday, March 17 at 7:00 p.m., or soon thereafter, the City Council shall conduct a public hearing on the question of whether the subject improvements shall be installed. Said hearing shall be conducted in the Council Chambers, City Hall, 100 West California Avenue, Ridgecrest, California.

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5. Notice

The Superintendent of Streets shall notify the owners or persons in possession of the subject properties by posting a "Notice to Construct" in a conspicuous place on each property and by mailing a postcard, postage prepaid, to the persons in possession of such property, or to the owners thereof at his last known address as the same appears on the last equalized assessment rolls or to the name and address of the person owning such property as shown in the records of the Office of the Clerk. The notice shall also specify the day, hour, and place when the City Council will hear and pass upon objections or protests, if any, which may be raised by any property owner or other interested persons.




